Focus on... Unemployment, Employability and EMA.

A report out yesterday by The Commission on Youth Employment said that "radical and immediate action" is needed to address the UK's youth unemployment emergency. All 12 North East Local Authorities are among 152 LAs in England, Scotland and Wales where over one in eight 16-24 year olds claim job seekers allowance. The Commission's Chair, David Miliband MP said that in his South Shields constituency unemployment has risen by 200% in the past year.

The Commission supports plans to introduce Destination Measures for schools and calls upon Government to give education providers stronger incentives to prepare the most disadvantaged young people for progression towards work and review the role of Ofsted in holding schools to account for the work readiness of their students.

On the issue of work experience the Commission recommends that the statutory requirement should remain. This view is backed up by a report from the Education and Employers Taskforce that looked at ways to prevent young people from dropping out. They found that the more young people come into contact with employers while they are at school, the less likely they are to go on to be unemployed.

The Youth Employment Commission's findings coincide with this year's National Apprenticeship Week, which aims to highlight the benefits of taking on apprentices to employers and promote the opportunities apprenticeships can provide to young people. To support the expansion of apprenticeships the Commission recommends the introduction of a national application system for apprenticeships similar to the UCAS system for University places.

These reports follow last week's announcement of major changes to vocational education in the UK. Most of the changes introduced as a result of the Wolf report are welcomed by the Commission, however an Observer Editorial on Monday states that "Mr Gove's overhaul of vocational education is

necessary, although too brutal. In the two years before the streamlining takes place, he and we have time to consider what a world-class education system ought to offer.” The article then goes on to argue that a vocational element is vital to a full education, “we are often “blighted by a notion that divides academic and vocational into first- and second-class educations, while non-cognitive abilities, the ingredients that make up employability, are an “extra” instead of an integral part of learning.”

Finally, research by Barnardos released today has found that the Governments Bursary Scheme designed to replace the axed Educational Maintenance Allowance is inadequate meaning that many poor students are faced with no option but to drop out of further education. Barnardos calls for immediate improvements to the way the Bursary Fund is targeted and administered including increasing payments to £30 a week, and widening funding to all young people who have received free school meals. But a Department for Education spokesman said: “The Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) was wasteful and poorly targeted. Some 45% of all 16-19 year olds received it, including many private school pupils.

SCHOOLS NorthEast is working with organisations across the region to explore how we can best support our children and young people to develop the aspirations, motivations and skills needed to prosper in their future working lives. In the coming months we will be launching a series of initiatives. These include an Alumni scheme for North East schools. This will enable schools to identify and reconnect to ex pupils that can be used to inspire children and young people about the world of work and provide practical advice on careers.

Local news story of the week...North East joins in National Apprenticeship Week

Events are taking place around the region to mark National Apprenticeships Week after figures revealed a big increase in the number of positions. Department for Business, Innovation and Skills statistics show a 167% increase in the number of new apprenticeships started in the region in 2010/11 compared with 2006/07.

In Newcastle, the city council today launches its own week of action to encourage young people and private firms to sign up for apprenticeships.

Northumberland firm SCA Hygiene Products UK is marking the week by appointing 13 new apprentices at its paper mill in Prudhoe.

Hartlepool College of Further Education runs more than 180 apprentice courses and is giving youngsters the chance to learn more and also meet potential employers.

In Stockton, MP James Wharton swapped the House of Commons for computer aided design when he took up his role as a North East Chamber of Commerce apprentice for Teesside company CAD21.

5,000 head teachers lack leadership, says Ofsted chief

Sir Michael Wilshaw, the new chief schools inspector, has claimed Head Teachers in more than 5,000 schools are not up to standard and are responsible for unacceptably high levels of poor teaching. He said he wanted less tolerance of poor leadership and a 'no excuses culture' in which head teachers stopped using poverty to explain low exam grades. He also blamed the poor leadership for the 'national disaster' of thousands of teachers leaving the profession soon after qualifying, as their enthusiasm is dimmed by head teachers' failure to enforce behaviour rules for children.

Educational development: one in four children 'at risk'

A quarter of today's children are living in families which pose more than one risk to their educational development, a study says.

Institute of Education researchers analysed 10 risk factors affecting more than 18,000 families. Risks included financial stress, teenage parenthood, depression, low skills, and substance/ alcohol abuse. Previous research suggests families with multiple risk factors are the most damaging.

The government has pledged to turn around the lives of England's 120,000 most troubled families by 2015. To qualify for help, the families need to meet five out of seven criteria - including truanting children, parents with addiction and anti-social behaviour.

Teach First in primary schools

Last year independent charity Teach First expanded to the North East and this year (2012/13) it will be placing participants in primary schools for the first time. Teach First recruits high quality, well rounded graduates to teach in schools in challenging circumstances (your school meets the strict eligibility criteria) for a minimum of two years, whilst completing a workplace based teacher training and leadership development programme (which includes a PGCE) provided in partnership with Northumbria University. There are currently 40 participants teaching across 20 North East schools and Teach First hopes to place a similar number of participants in both primary and secondary schools this year.

As I'm sure you're aware, Teach First originally began as an organisation placing in secondary schools, however, following a three year pilot, primary has now been rolled out permanently across the country. The new primary model was based on a positive and comprehensive evaluation by the TDA, and designed in conjunction with primary head teachers, university tutors and experts from across the primary sector. This partnership approach has meant that the programme has developed with pupil impact and the needs of schools at its core. This has led to 75% of those primary participants passing QTS at the outstanding level (21% at good) with 70% still teaching in the classroom.

In this new feature, we ask a local Head give us a brief insight into their school. This week we spoke to George Ford from the Federation of Abbey Schools in Darlington.

Our school is... an established hard federation of junior and infant schools in the west end of Darlington. We converted to academy status on August 2011. Our site has evolved both internally and externally and offers a real primary philosophy and the transition opportunities that benefit all 630 children and 70 staff. We believe that effective collaboration that focuses on learning at all levels is the key to the success of any school.

Our school motto is ... Teaching, learning and growing together in friendship

Our school is good at... ensuring children leave us with a good level of attainment in the core subjects and that they have support to develop individual talents. At producing children who can communicate and have the confidence that prepares them for the rigours of secondary education.

Our school is working on... developing our academy status and operating independently for the benefit of our children and the community.

The biggest challenges for our school are... having consistent approaches when giving messages across a large school site. Providing challenge for children who come from family homes where high achievement is expected.

We think other schools would be interested in our... Staff development, particularly linked to leadership for the future. We were involved in the initial teacher training of seven of our TLRs as part and then they followed our Middle Leader Programme. Our deputies have completed NPQH and we were part of the co construct pilot for the National Primary Executive Heads Programme. Pupil development that has incorporated international links and exchange visits for pupils to Russia and China (Y6) and France (Y4)
